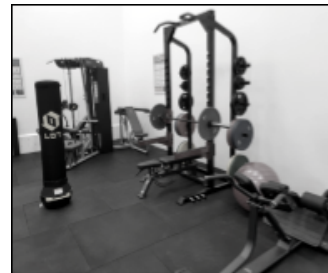


The Three Springs Gym Is Open

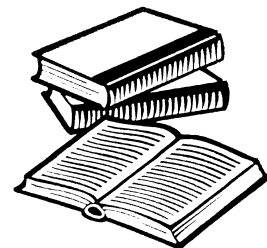

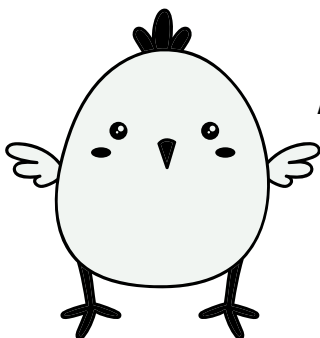

Retailers must act honestly on extended warranties

It's a familiar scenario for many shoppers – you're about to pay for a new car or appliance, then the salesperson tries to 'upsell' you with an extended warranty for things that may go wrong after the manufacturer's warranty expires.

As the end of financial year sales roll around, we want consumers to seriously question whether buying this type of insurance policy means paying for rights they already have for free under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL).

These rights require retailers to help you if a product breaks within a reasonable period of time, regardless of any extended warranty purchased or if the manufacturer's warranty has lapsed.

In the last 12 months, Consumer Protection has received 420 enquiries and 113 complaints about extended warranties, mostly relating to the purchase of motor vehicles. We also heard from consumers who encountered issues after buying extended warranties on washing machines & dryers, televisions, microwaves, furniture, and even on an air-con remote controller.

The main issues involved consumers being unable to seek a satisfactory remedy after a fault developed, or unaware their particular issue wasn't covered under the policy.

A recent investigation by consumer advocacy group CHOICE found 91 per cent of major electrical stores visited by a mystery shopper were trying to upsell customers with extended warranties that offered no more for the customers than their rights under the ACL.

Nobody likes wasting money – so next time you're offered an extended warranty in a shop or car dealership, ask the salesperson directly about the benefits over and above your existing rights under the ACL to a refund, replacement or repair if the product is faulty.

Also ask whether the policy has any important exclusions and restrictions, or special requirements to ensure the extended warranty policy remains valid, such as a cleaning regime or regular servicing of a vehicle with the selling dealer.

Failure due to fair wear and tear may not be covered, so consider whether the cost of an extended warranty is worth it compared with the cost of the product and its likely lifespan.

It is against the law for a retailer to mislead you or use unfair tactics to pressure you into buying an extended warranty, so report any instances of this to Consumer Protection via our [website](http://www.consumerprotection.wa.gov.au) at www.consumerprotection.wa.gov.au or email consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au or call 1300 30 40 54.

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Leaving a rental home

When it comes time to move out of a rental property, knowing what's involved in advance can help ensure things run more smoothly.

How much notice to give depends on whether a fixed-term or periodic tenancy is being wound-up. Even though a fixed-term tenancy is for the period agreed in writing, it does not end automatically – notice must be given by either party 30 days' before the expiry date, or it will rollover into a periodic lease. A periodic tenancy can be concluded by the tenant giving at least 21 days' notice in writing, or the landlord/agent giving 60 days' notice.

In cases where a home has been repossessed by the mortgagee, such as a bank, you will be given 30 days' notice to move out. The mortgagee cannot ask you to pay rent during this 30-day period.

If you need to 'break lease', be aware that it can be costly. Firstly you'll need to seek written permission from the landlord and come to an arrangement, before potentially paying rent until a replacement tenant is found.

When vacating a rental, you are required to leave the property in the same condition (less fair 'wear and tear') as when you first moved in. For this reason, it is wise to ensure the Property Condition Report signed at the start is accurate, take photos of the property both at the beginning and end of the lease, plus attend the final inspection (if possible) to sort out any potential issues on the spot.

If you have not cleaned the property to a reasonable standard, or if minor repairs are needed, you'll probably need to meet the costs involved to fix the problem.

Landlords and agents cannot insist you use a specific company or trader to undertake any of the repairs or cleaning, neither can they charge you for a pre-estimated cost – they are only allowed to charge you for the actual costs incurred.

If there's a dispute over how the security bond is to be paid-out, you can apply for conciliation by Consumer Protection. Should that fail, the Magistrates Court can settle the matter.

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Boarders and lodgers have rights too

Rising rents and a lack of available homes have prompted many Western Australians to seek out share houses as a way of keeping a roof over their heads at a price they can afford.

Before taking on a housemate, or becoming one yourself, it's crucial that everyone understands the arrangement they have agreed to, as the law applies differently to boarders and lodgers than it does to co-tenants or sub-tenants.

If you pay rent to stay at someone else's house, then you're likely to be considered a lodger. If meals are supplied too, you're probably a boarder. Because neither boarders nor lodgers are technically considered 'tenants', they aren't covered by the Residential Tenancies Act 1987 (which protects co-tenants and sub-tenants), but instead have rights under both common law and the Australian Consumer Law (ACL).

Under the ACL, the property must be fit for purpose, meaning it must be safe, habitable and meet your needs as discussed with the landlord at the beginning.

Should a major problem arise with your boarder or lodger arrangement – such as a serious issue (or a series of smaller issues) that would've stopped you moving in – the landlord must fix the issue in a reasonable time.

In rooming or boarding arrangements that continue over a number of years, there may be changes to the services that were initially agreed upon and the landlord must let you know about them as soon as possible. For major changes the landlord must seek your consent to continue with the change, or offer you a new agreement at a lower cost.

The landlord is also not allowed to making false or misleading representations about the property or services, such as claiming there is air-conditioning when there isn't, or agreeing to provide a wide variety of meals when they don't.

If you have a problem with the property or the services provided, contact your landlord directly in the first instance to give them the opportunity to fix the problem. If this doesn't work, we may be able to help negotiate an agreed outcome.

If you are not sure whether you are a boarder, lodger, co-tenant or sub-tenant, contact Consumer Protection consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au or 1300 30 40 54 to discuss. In some circumstances it may be necessary for a court to make a binding decision about which one you are.

GROWING REGIONS FUND EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST OPENS 5 JULY 5 July 2023

Expressions of Interest for the Growing Regions Program – Round 1 (the Program), opened today, 5 July 2023, said the Hon Melissa Price MP, Federal Member for Durack.

After an extended wait of 14 months, this long anticipated funding round is the Labor Government's replacement of the Coalition's highly successful Building Better Regions Fund. The Growing Regions Program provides grants of between \$500,000 and \$15 million to First Nations Community Controlled Organisations, incorporated non-profit organisations and local government agencies or bodies in regional areas for capital works projects that deliver community and economic infrastructure projects across regional and rural Australia.

The Hon Melissa Price said "The importance of infrastructure funding in my electorate of Durack cannot be understated. Hopefully this new funding round will help deliver the essential infrastructure that contributes to the vibrancy and viability of local communities. I have seen fantastic results in Durack from the Coalition Government's Building Better Regions Fund commitment of \$1.38 billion across nearly 1,300 projects and I look forward to seeing the successful outcome for more Durack communities with the new Growing Regions Program".

The objectives of the Program are:

- to construct or upgrade community infrastructure that fills an identified gap or need
- to contribute to achieving a wide range of community socio-economic outcomes
- to be strategically aligned with regional priorities.

Growing Regions Program Round 1 will be delivered through a two-stage selection process. An Expression of Interest must be submitted at Stage 1 and if successful, applicants will be invited to submit a full application for Stage 2.

Local volunteers bring Hill River Fairy Terns back from the brink

The Fairy Tern is a small, coastal seabird, found between Karratha and Esperance WA. They measure about 250 mm from their bill- to tail-tip, and in peak breeding condition, they feature a dark black head cap and bright orange bill and legs. Sadly, it is estimated that there are fewer than 3,000 pairs of Fairy Terns left in WA due to the loss of breeding habitat combined with disturbance from intensive human-induced activity has resulted in reduced breeding success.

According to the WA Fairy Tern Conservation Network and the Conservation Council of WA, the mouth of the Hill River near Jurien Bay was a classic spot for fairy tern breeding and nesting, however, a colony had never succeeded due to off-road 4-wheel driving, feral animals, and illegal camping.

Earlier this year, Midlands Biosecurity Group (MBG) Licensed Pest Management Technician (LPMT), Andy Walker had the opportunity to take on work in a volunteer capacity to support the protection and re-establishment of the Fairy Tern population at this site after some pairs were spotted.

Andy jumped at the opportunity to assist in the project where Jurien Bay locals, shire rangers and experts worked together for the first time to protect a nesting colony found in the area.

As an LPMT and an integral part of the MBG team, Andy believes effective feral pest control is important not only to ensure the agricultural industry is able to remain profitable but also for the protection of the natural environment in which native species reside.

“Myself and others camped out for many nights to protect the breeding site from foxes and cats but also to prevent illegal campers which is a common issue there. We successfully removed half a dozen foxes and cats through trapping,” Andy said.

The MBG donated cameras to the project and exclusion fencing, signage were all installed by volunteers and shire rangers to help protect the birds.

Shelters built by the Jurien’s Bay Men Shed were placed at the nesting grounds, giving the vulnerable chicks shade and overhead protection.

Thanks to this tremendous community effort, it was reported that there were at least 38 chicks born, 23 of which were banded. These numbers may not seem huge but in a year of low breeding, the success of this particular population is very significant. These numbers suggest future breeding seasons will continue to be highly productive with the assistance of this project.

The success of this initial project which had no funding and was completely volunteer run, has meant that the project will now receive funding for the next breeding season.
