Your crash, their payday? Claims harvesting explained

Picture this – your car has been badly rear-ended in peak hour traffic and you shakily give your personal details to the first tow truck driver on the scene, who takes your car away. A few days later you receive a call from a lawyer who knows all about your car accident and tells you they can “help” you get a significant payout for your minor whiplash.

What you don’t know is that tow truck driver was looking to make some extra cash on the side and they sold your personal details to a law firm.

Or maybe you received an unexpected call, email or text asking about a car accident and injuries you may have sustained. How did they know about your bingle from last year? You pass on your details and these are then also sold to a law firm who tries to convince you to use them to make a claim with the Insurance Commission of Western Australia (ICWA).

These are forms of claims harvesting and these people are scammers. They’ll often cold-call people hoping to strike it lucky and get someone who has had an accident. They could even pretend to be from the Insurance Commission or other car insurers in an attempt to collect your personal information.

The ICWA has launched a public awareness campaign to warn the community about claim harvesters. Taking advantage of people when they have had a crash, especially when they’re injured and vulnerable, is not on. People have reported being harassed, promised large payouts and tricked into making false claims or exaggerating their injuries through certain lawyers. If they do go ahead with the claim they can be left with little or none of the compensation payout after legal fees.

Apart from this misuse of personal information and harassment, the practice costs all Western Australians. It is estimated that 27 per cent of injury insurance claims are made following claims harvesting behaviour. As a result, an estimated \$14 per vehicle in compulsory third-party insurance premium fees paid by all WA vehicle owners is spent on managing harvesting behaviour rather than being spent on medical treatment for those injured in a crash.

A Bill was introduced into WA Parliament to stop the predatory behaviour of claims harvesting. If passed, it will be an offence for anyone to buy, sell or solicit personal details as a motor injury claim referral.

Along with ICWA, Consumer Protection is encouraging the public to beware of this behaviour and if they are contacted about a crash unexpectedly, to hang up and report it to icwa.wa.gov.au.

Free mammograms for women

Women 40 years and over with no symptoms are eligible for a FREE screening mammogram.

Breast cancer is the most common life threatening cancer for women and 1 in 7 women in Australia will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

Having a screening mammogram (breast x-ray) every two years significantly increases the chance of a woman surviving breast cancer and reduces the amount of treatment required. More than 75% of breast cancers occur in women over the age of 50. Research shows that screening is most effective for this age group.

BreastScreen WA's Medical Director Dr Elizabeth Wylie, said screening mammography was the most effective method for early detection of breast cancer.

"Screening every two years is vitally important to increase the chance of a breast cancer being detected when it is too small to feel or be noticed. Finding a cancer at this early stage often means that the breast cancer is small and more treatable".

"A free screening mammogram is one of the best things that women can do to look after their health. Breast screening saves lives and only takes 20 minutes," said Dr Wylie.

Screening mammograms may detect 70-90% of breast cancers.

Any woman with a persistent change in a breast should contact her doctor immediately.

What's Up in the Night Sky?

Meteor Shower Spectacular

Stargazers will be treated to a special display when the Eta-Aquarids Meteor Shower peaks this month. A meteor shower occurs when our planet Earth passes through the trail of debris left by a comet after it has completed its journey around our Sun. This shower is the result of Halley's Comet which orbits the sun once every 76 years. It's not due to return to Earth until 2061, however it still treats us to two meteor showers per year with the second shower being the Orionids on display in October.

The eta-Aquarids Meteor Shower is active from 19th April to 28th May with the peak happening on 6th May. With no Moon to wash out the views, it will be perfect conditions. It's predicted that there will be up to 30 meteors per hour at the peak of activity. It's worth watching this meteor shower in the days either side of the peak as well. Meteors can be seen in off-peak times too.

When and where to look: Early morning before sunrise on 6th May. Look near to Saturn in the east for the radiant point of this meteor shower.

From mid-autumn to mid-spring, we look towards the centre or core of our own galaxy and see a cloudy band of billions of stars that arcs from the south east to the south west. Many people around the world are unable to witness this breathtaking view due to light pollution, however out in country WA, we can enjoy the experience of seeing the stunning Milky Way Galaxy in all its glory.

When and where to look: Well after sunset on moonless nights are the best times to see the Milky Way. Look to the south east and south west.

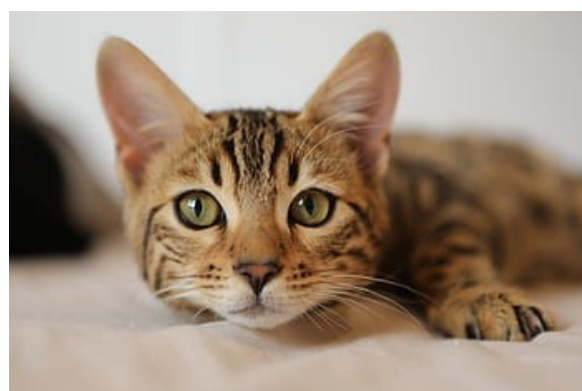
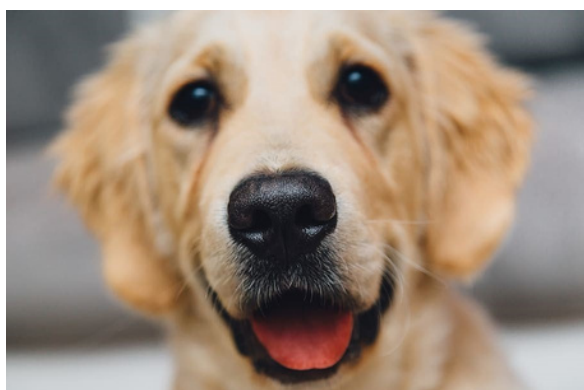

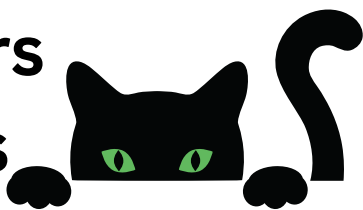

Laws for Responsible Dog Owners

Your responsibilities

Dog control Penalty: \$200 to \$5,000 If you own a dog, you have a legal responsibility to keep it under control, either within a fenced area on your property or on a leash when in public.

Dogs barking Penalty: \$200 to \$5,000 As a dog owner, you are responsible for ensuring that your dog is not creating a public nuisance by barking excessively. Nuisance barking also covers public places adjoining the premises.

Removal of dog droppings Penalty: Varies Dog droppings are a source of annoyance to other users of footpaths and recreation areas. Most local governments have local laws that require the person in charge of the dog in a public place to remove their dog's droppings and adequately dispose of it.

Penalties for dog attacks Penalty: \$3,000 to \$20,000 Potential imprisonment A dog attack is a very serious matter. If your dog attacks a person or another animal, you will be held responsible even if you are not there at the time.

Dog registration Penalty: \$200 A dog owner is legally required to register his or her dog with the appropriate local government if it is more than three months old. Contact your local government for a registration form and list of applicable fees.

Registration tags Penalty: \$200 Your dog is required to wear a collar to which must be attached a valid registration tag. This tag will be issued by your local government when you pay your registration fee

Feral pig numbers down thanks to control efforts and dry summer

While many are ready for the summer to come to an end, the dry conditions and minimal resources available to feral pigs have been ideal for feral pig control conducted in our region over recent months.

Ongoing pressure and coordination have been the key to maximising the results of this summer's control program according to Midlands Biosecurity Group (MBG) Licensed Pest Management Technician (LPMT), Paul Pitaro.

"Fortunately in the pig space, we have kept pressure up fairly heavily and as such we are seeing reduced numbers. That doesn't mean that numbers are low everywhere, just the areas we concentrate heavily in," Mr Pitaro said.

These areas are those where feral pig populations have been notoriously high or landholders who have been proactive in reporting and working with the MBG.

The MBG implements a year-round, landscape-scale program consisting mainly of baiting, trapping, and shooting, paired with the occasional aerial cull to "mop up" feral pigs remaining in areas that are not easily accessed by car or on foot.

A recent aerial cull conducted in the Shires of Mingenew and Morawa resulted in 339 pigs destroyed in the landscape and, remarkably, only one litter of piglets was spotted on the ground over the 3-day cull.

"Normally we see a number of these litters on the ground at any given time, however, between the poor season and the amount of pressure we have been putting on them, it may have slowed or disrupted reproduction a little," Mr Pitaro said.

The aerial cull was conducted in conjunction with the Central Wheatbelt Biosecurity Association to reduce large mob numbers further and included 22 hours of flying time. This was the eighth aerial cull conducted together with the CWBA in six years with almost 6000 pigs culled as a result.

Despite these terrific efforts and positive signs, Mr Pitaro insists landholders need to remain vigilant as feral pigs are unpredictable.

"Numbers may be lower than usual coming off an average season, but on the other hand they could explode and come out of the woodwork when feed starts shooting up all around the place," Mr Pitaro said.

The MBG recommends reporting any signs or sightings of feral pigs as soon as possible.

The local biosecurity group will continue to focus its work on feral pigs, rabbits, foxes and wild dogs as these pests have been identified as the most detrimental to farming enterprises in our region.

Landholders can access the MBGs bait freezers and our LPMTs are available to support landholders interested in conducting pest control on-farm. For more information and LPMT contact details, visit www.mbg.org.au.

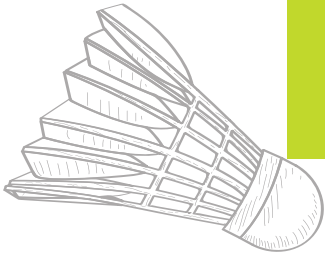
